


Term One has been incredibly busy and eventful, but that is Loreto life and we love it! It is hard to believe how fast the term has gone.






# New Besinnings

In this first of a three-part series to celebrate our 140th anniversary, Loreto Province Archivist Robin Scott tells the story of the Loreto Sisters in Ballarat.





This formidable and yet gentle woman was reluctant to travel across the world from Dublin to Ballarat, but courageously accepted her mission. Ballarat was not quite the frontier town that she had been expecting. By 1875, the frantic chaos of the gold rush was over and Ballarat was becoming a sophisticated city which was looking to educate the children and grandchildren of those early goldminers.

On arriving in Ballarat, Mother Gonzaga and the seven professed Sisters and two potential postulants were greeted by the large contingent of migrants; mainly Irish Catholics but also Protestants and Jews from Great Britain, America and Europe. Mother Gonzaga wrote in her travel diary,

"...some of the people crowded round us and begged to touch our hands; one of them, a young girl, having got this boon, rushed off to a vacant spot and performed a very energetic dance to her own satisfaction, showing off the hand that had been shaken by a nun."

Setting up in the St. Alipius Presbytery (the weatherboard house that preceded the current presbytery) the party settled into Ballarat and within months had purchased our Sturt Street property. The

Victorian neo-classical style house had been built by local businessman and politician, Edward Agar Wynne, in the late 1860s. M. Gonzaga described the house as,

"...built of a kind of cane-coloured stone, it is two stories high and has a verandah of stone round it. Flower and kitchen garden, greenhouse etc. ... the view from the grounds is beautiful...".

The community moved into their new home on the banks of Lake Wendouree on 23rd September 1875 and celebrated their first Mass on 24th September. A temporary Day School was opened for the local children on 29th September and the Boarding School, which was to be Mary's Mount's role until the 1940s, on 2nd October.

On 4th November 1875, a much needed Day School was opened in the centre of the city in Dawson Street.

The life of the young ladies at Mary's Mount and Dawson Street was filled with a wide range of educational, social and spiritual opportunities; from astronomy to horse riding, soirees to dancing, early morning Mass to Saints' Feast Day processions. Mother Gonzaga's philosophy of education was a holistic one, designed to shape "wise, lovable and well-educated women".





As Mary's Mount was solely a boarding school in those early years, it was home to girls from younger primary to matriculation class if university entrance was sought, or a finishing class for extra cultural refinement. Some girls entered the novitiate to train as Sisters directly from school. Such was the reputation of the school, that girls from all around Australia attended, a few only to return home once a year. Loreto Convent Dawson Street provided for the local students who received similar opportunities with the same educational philosophy and, with the regular rotation of the sisters, often the same teachers.

From its Ballarat beginnings in 1875, Loreto education quickly spread with schools and convents founded in Portland, Melbourne, Sydney and Perth by 1900. Defying the tyranny of distance, Mother Gonzaga ultimately facilitated a Loreto education for young women in all the mainland States, including kindergartens and tertiary training colleges.

# Not Your Usual Schoolies

# For a number of Loreto College graduates, an inspirational journey to Cambodia provided a unique version of the 'schoolies' tradition.

In November 2014, 21 Loreto College graduates from the Class of 2014 began their two week journey to Cambodia - an alternative to 'schoolies'. We travelled with a program called World Challenge, an organisation that provides educational school trips that inspire students to take on the world. They believe that life skills, such as resilience, empathy and leadership, are developed through real life experience and we enable young people to develop these key skills through powerful student-led expeditions to the developing world.

After meeting our World Challenge Leaders in Melbourne and a ten hour flight, we arrived in Phnom Penh, the capital of Cambodia. We spent three nights in the hustle and bustle of Phnom Penh, spending our time learning the local language known as Khmer from the locals, visiting markets and tasting the local food. We also spent one of our days learning of the horrific history of Cambodia, when the country was being ruled by the dictator Pol Pot. We visited the killing fields and S21, the prison and torture grounds used by the Khmer.

We spent the majority of our time in Cambodia taking part in community service in Battambang, where we stayed in a community centre known as the Ptea Teuk Dong Centre. The PTD Centre has a school on site where children have the option to go to take part in

English classes, additional to the ones they have during their compulsory school hours. The Centre also provides a home for some families who have been affected by physical and sexual abuse. As a part of the World Challenge program, we were given two projects at the Centre which were to be completed over the course of a week. One of the projects was to clear out rubbish and debris from an old building in preparation for a concrete slab on the floor. This was to allow the building to be used again for mushroom farming. The second project was to remove wooden floor boards from a room on stilts and to build a small brick wall at the bottom. The hot humid weather made this hard work, but it was such a rewarding experience to see what our efforts had achieved in the end. We were also given the opportunity to spend some time in the classrooms teaching the students some new English phrases and skills.

Overall, our stay in Cambodia provided an incredible experience which we will never forget. It showed us how little people need to survive, yet these people can still manage to be some of the happiest people in the world. It sometimes takes overseas travel to throw life into perspective. What we see as hardship tends to pale into insignificance when compared to the number of people who live without the luxuries we consider to be the norm.

As we celebrate the academic achievements of the Class of 2014, I would like to share with you an excerpt from College Dux Meg Bray's speech to the students and guests at our Academic Assembly.

"I'd like to personally congratulate each of the award recipients, and welcome every student on starting yet another wonderful year at Loreto College. For many of you, this marks the start of a whole new experience; one filled with excitements, new friendships and new challenges. For most, this year is yet another stepping stone as you navigate your way through secondary school life. And for some, this will be your final and most challenging year of all. It is for this reason that I wish to share with you my experiences during VCE and offer some insights for the year ahead.

Having sat in your position for six years, I remember listening intently to the Dux speeches, seeking advice, but also searching for the formula that would somehow produce amazing results.

My first piece of advice would be to treat every assessment, test and exam as important, regardless of your year level. You should never ask the question "does this count towards my ATAR?" as this mindset can easily deteriorate into a habit of failing to try, instead of embracing the opportunity to test yourself. I can honestly say that I worked just as hard in Year 11 as I did in Year 12. If you develop good study habits early, I guarantee that by the time you reach VCE, you will feel much more prepared and in control.

Also, choosing the subjects that you believe you'll enjoy is much more important than selecting subjects that scale well. Make sure you meet your course requirements for further study, but also ensure that you're going to enjoy your final years at school. The subjects that I selected were based on my interests and passion; I found that this enabled me to strive to achieve my personal best. You only get one shot, so make the most of it.

A valuable discovery I made during secondary school, especially in VCE, was the difference between studying for longer and studying smarter. Studying for four hours each night with no breaks is not only unrealistic, but also ineffective. Try not to get overwhelmed by the magnitude of the work. Year 12 is only nine months of your life, and you will suffer more anxiety if you don't keep on top of your workload. If you diligently chip away a little at a time, you will find that you are less stressed. There is an end in sight, and the only way to get there is to immerse yourself in your studies with absolute determination.

Throughout Year 12, I recognised that the formula I was searching for consisted of four simple principles; consistency, determination, balance and hard work. Success is more about consistency than about brains. If you work consistently towards your personal goal, you will be surprised at the potential you have.

My mantra throughout last year was to maintain a balance between my own health, my social life and my work. I was never a student who could come home immediately from school and study for four hours straight. Each night, I made a conscious effort to go to the gym, catch up with a friend or simply just relax. I always felt re-energised having had that time to myself.

Although there is only one DUX each year, everybody can achieve personal excellence. Success does not mean achieving the highest ATAR or the best test result; success is using the opportunities you're given to achieve your personal goals. All you have to do is work towards it. Set your goals and work as hard as you can, so this time next year, you can reflect on your efforts with pride.

Most importantly, never stop believing in yourself. All the hard work, all the late nights, and the extra practice exams, will be worth it at the end when you can look at your ATAR and say in all honesty, that you've done your best.

Your six years at Loreto College is like a roller-coaster; at first it's scary, there are highs and lows, and sometimes the world is turned upside down, but in the end, you'll look back, see how quickly it all went by, and line up for the next ride of your life."

An exploration of the motivations behind the ANZAC's has led to a great honour for this Year 10 student. Following an entry process beginning in 2014, Madelyn Rothe (Year 10) was announced as the Victorian runner up for the 2015 Simpson Prize this past March. The national history contest on the ANZAC tradition for Year 9-10 students attracted a record 2296 entries this year, more than double the number of entries for the 2014 prize.

Madelyn was announced at a special ceremony at Parliament House in Canberra, with Minister for Veteran Affairs Senator Michael Ronaldson presenting her with the prize.

The Simpson Prize encourages participants to focus on the significance of Anzac Day and to consider what Anzac Day means to them and to Australia. As explained by Simpson Prize Chair Mr Paul Foley, students submitted essays or audio visual presentations on the question: To what extent did Australians enlist in 1914 to defend the 'Mother Country'?

"Students were encouraged to identify and explore the motivation for young men and women to volunteer for service in 1914 and then scrutinize a variety of sources to uncover historical evidence which supported the proposition of individuals who rallied to the defence of the British Empire or simply and naively thought this would be an adventure" he said.

Madelyn spent three days in Canberra with her fellow prize winners.

"It was a great experience to meet like-minded students from across the country as we toured Parliament House, the Hall of Memory and the Royal Military College Duntroon amongst others" she said.

"On the final day, we visited the National Archives of Australian to preside over 100 year-old documents of Australian soldiers. It was an unforgettable experience."

Loreto College Ballarat Deputy Principal (Learning & Teaching) Ms Linda McDonald encouraged Miss Rothe to enter the competition in early 2014.

"At all times we encourage our students to aspire for excellence and I congratulate Madelyn on her efforts in always aiming for personal excellence as seen with this significant prize" she said.


