What is a **chef**?

A chef is a culinary professional who specialises in the preparation, cooking, and presentation of food. Chefs work in a variety of settings, including restaurants, hotels, catering companies, and residential facilities. Their role goes beyond cooking; chefs also plan menus, source ingredients, manage kitchen staff, and ensure the smooth kitchen operations.

What skills and strengths are needed?

Chefs must be creative and have a passion for food. They need excellent organisational skills; the ability to multitask; and the ability to keep calm in fast-paced environments. Teamwork and communication are crucial, as are problem-solving skills. A keen eye for detail and a commitment to high standards of food safety and hygiene are also necessary.

What are the pathways?

An apprenticeship is the usual pathway to become a qualified chef with a Certificate III in Commercial Cookery then continued education and on-the-job training.

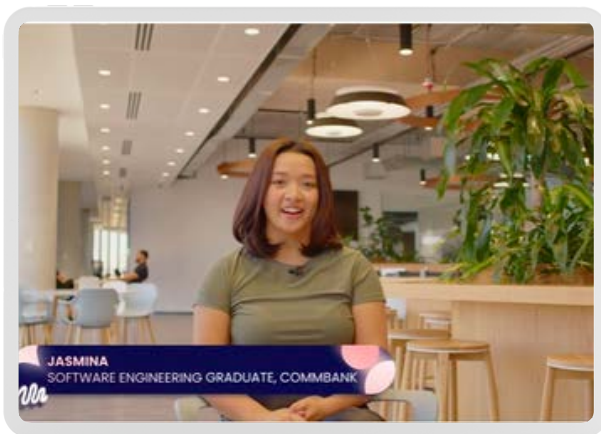

Boosting women in STEM



ATSE's Elevate: Boosting women in STEM program awards more than 500 scholarships to women and non-binary people in STEM.

The Elevate program provides:

- A scholarship.
- Access to events and networking.
- Mentoring.
- Wellbeing support during scholars' university studies.

Undergraduate category:

To receive an Undergraduate Scholarship you must have an intention to study a degree focusing on science, technology, engineering or mathematics, administered by a STEM School or Faculty, e.g. Faculty of Engineering. Degrees administered by non-STEM faculties or that qualify an individual for a specific occupation, e.g. medicine, speech pathology, etc. are ineligible.

Eligibility:

To be considered, applicants need to:

- Identify as a woman or non-binary person.
- Be enrolling as a domestic student at an Australian university.
- Be planning to undertake a STEM undergraduate degree, commencing in 2025.

ATSE particularly encourages applications from individuals who identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander; individuals from regional, rural or remote areas; LGBTQIA+; individuals from culturally or linguistically diverse backgrounds; low-socioeconomic backgrounds; or those living with a disability.

Applications:

- Applications close at 5:00pm (AEST) on Friday the 30th of August 2024.
- Scholarships announced November 2024.





AFP - Directions Program

Directions is a structured 12-month program where First Nations people can experience the range of support and specialist roles available at the AFP.

Who should apply

The Directions Program seeks out First Nations candidates who are:

- great at communication
- good problem solvers
- out-of-the-box thinkers
- able to work well in a team
- ready to learn new skills.

No formal qualifications are required. If this sounds like you, we encourage you to apply.

Timing and location

The Directions Program runs from February to February each year with the selection process starting several months prior.

Positions are primarily based in Canberra. Some state-based positions exist, but these depend on organisational requirements.

When you apply, consider that you may have to move to Canberra - you will receive financial help for relocation (if required).

About the Directions Program

As a participant, you'll:

- Have full-time employment.
- Complete induction activities and network with other Directions Program participants.
- Work in a number of roles across different teams.
- Complete a Certificate IV qualification.
- Be supported by buddies, mentors and the Mulunggang Indigenous Officer Network.
- Have the opportunity for progression when you complete the program.



Roles in the Program

You might find yourself in a variety of specialist and support roles, including: health and wellbeing; investigations; canines; cybersecurity; intelligence; corporate support; protection; workforce planning; media and communications.





What is the USI?

You may have heard of the Unique Student Identifier – or USI. It's made up of ten letters and numbers and is your education number for life. All students doing nationally recognised training, be it a VET in Schools course, First Aid training, or applying to university, must have a USI.

Why do I need a USI?

Without a USI, you won't be able to access Commonwealth supported places or HELP loans, and you won't receive your statement of attainment, qualification, or award upon completion of your studies.

Who should get a USI?

If you're considering a VET in Schools course for next year or if you're in Year 12 and thinking about further education, to create your USI without delay!

How do I get a USI?

The process is simple and can be completed in less than five minutes using one form of identification, such as a birth certificate or driver's license.

I've forgotten my USI

If you've already created a USI but have forgotten your details, you can easily find your USI by following a few simple steps.



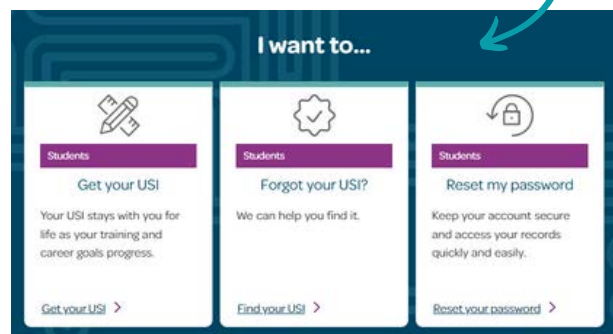
Using your USI

A USI also empowers you to take ownership of your education and training journey. With a USI, you can access your VET outcomes online in the form of an authenticated USI VET transcript.

Your VET transcript can be used:

- as a credit transfer or demonstrating pre-requisites for further training
- as a backup if the original documentation is lost and cannot be replaced
- to provide qualifications to employers and licensing bodies
- to reduce unnecessary retraining that can result from lost credentials.

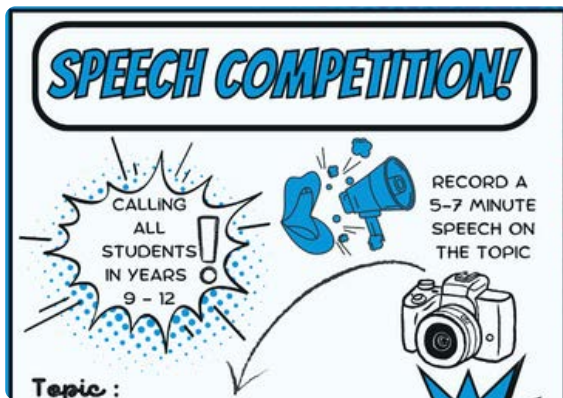

Theme: 'That is the great work of migration, building a nation'. How has post-war immigration contributed to Australia's development and prosperity?

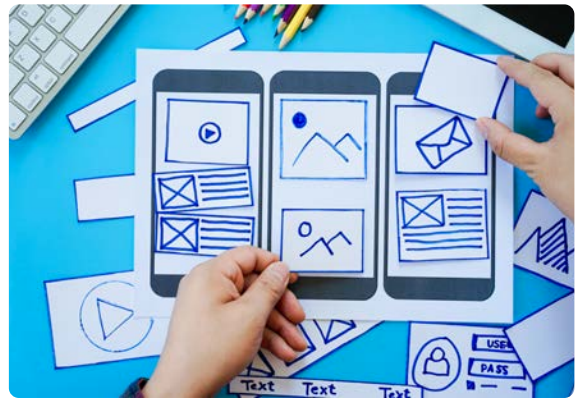
